
We interviewed Anthony Watkis, who is Harc's Job Developer. We asked him a few questions about himself and what his day is like working at Harc.




Capable Kids Camp

How do families find us?

A referral for an evaluation is the first step. Anyone can make a referral including, parents, foster parents and guardians, teachers, childcare providers, healthcare providers, case workers, and relatives or family friends. Evaluations and services are free of charge. Children with a significant developmental delay based on standardized test or a diagnosed medical condition that's likely to result in a developmental delay, qualify. We are here to help! Where in the community do we provide services?

Our services are provided in children's natural environments. These are places where children with and without developmental delays or disabilities spend their time; the family home, daycare, preschool, park, library, grocery store, restaurant, or the home of a friend or relative. Strategies embedded by families and caregivers into everyday routines and activities in these environments are most effective at enhancing children's learning and development.
